DEMONSTRATOR Michael Green

Michael bell is a young man now working full time on turning projects. He has worked with several master turners including Brendan Stemp.

We have all turned bowls but not with the cutting efficiency used by Michael. After he has made a spigot carefully matching the angle of the chuck jaws he prefers to use a heavy handle with interchangeable bowl type ends as this minimizes vibrations. When doing the roughing down to shape he uses a pull cut. That is having the tool flute horizontal and drawing it towards himself. Although this is a more scraping cut wood is removed quite quickly. When the shape is attained he looks closely to



see tear –out. Then using a very sharp tool he uses a push cut with the gouge to deal with the tear out – thus having less need for sanding.

A tool which Michael uses a lot is a negative rake scraper (as in the photo). It is really a heavy thick scraper sharpened like a skew chisel with a curved end. Not only is this very efficient with end grain but also with side grain. Tear-out is a minimum.

When sanding Michael likes to use a power sander either in a drill or one that spins when applied to turning wood. This is very useful with wood where the grain is widely spaced as the hard grain is removed as fast as the soft wood between.

Michael impressed how he made a very small finial starting with the point end first.

Our members were impressed with the competent, confident young man.

We have permission to sell items at that time. These will need to be of a high standard and have a name and price attached. The Guild will charge a commission of 20%.

UP 'MARKET 109 *Quality crafts at affordable prices*

The Koonung Community Cottage is organising Upmarket 109, a market where the various groups who meet at the Cottage will have an opportunity to sell items which they have made.

The Market is to be held on Saturday 19th November from 9.00am to 3pm.

We have been allocated a trestle table in one of the Cottage's three rooms.

Details which we have to follow:

- a. Set up is from 9.00am.
- b. Pack up is after 3.00pm.
- c. Stall holders are to provide a suitable table cloth, preferably floor length.
- d. Only two persons to be manning a stall at one time.
- e. Stall holders must ensure that displays do not project outside the designated space.
- f. Stall holders must provide the buyer some means of contact in case of product fault. This could mean labeling goods individually, labeling bags or providing a business card. This need only include a name and phone number.

Our committee has decided:

Items offered for sale must be of a high standard.

Items must include a tag or sticker indicating the price and phone number of the maker.

It would be preferable to have the items brought in some type of box/container that could be given to a purchaser.

The display and the choice of items for display will be solely at the discretion of the two persons manning the stall at any time.

A list of sales will be kept and a 20% commission paid to the Guild.

Members must bring their own items for sale and collect them at the conclusion of the market.

At the October meeting a roster will be sent around asking for volunteers to assist Rav Smith in the operation of the stall.

TOY APPEAL

The annual Harold Irving Christmas Toy Appeal will be held again this year with recipients being Eastern Relief and the Salvation Army. **This has been a Guild highlight for many years.** Members are again asked to assist by making high quality toys for all ages or make a donation of toys.

These will be presented to the recipients at the meeting on November 26th.
